Subject: Proposed map boundary correction to the Bijou Al Tahoe Community Plan and the Truckee Marsh Plan Area Statement 100 to incorporate one parcel into the boundary of the Bijou-Al Tahoe Community Plan

Summary and Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Governing Board approve the amendment to the Regional Plan map, the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan map boundary, and Truckee Marsh Plan Area Statement ("PAS") 100 map boundary, as proposed. This amendment would correct a mapping error for APN 026-221-029 which is currently shown within the Truckee Marsh PAS and include the parcel to the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan boundary, as shown in Appendix D, and as originally adopted at the time of the Community Plan adoption. This amendment would change the boundary of both local plan documents; no other changes to the allowable uses are proposed in either plan documents.

Required Motions:

In order to recommend adoption of the proposed ordinance amendments, the Governing Board must make the following motions, based on the staff report:

- A motion to recommend approval of the Required Findings, as described in Attachment B, including a finding of no significant effect, for adoption of the Community Plan and Plan Area Statement amendment as described in the staff report; and
- A motion to recommend adoption of Ordinance 2023-___, amending Ordinance No. 2022-03, as previously amended, and Ordinance No. 1987-9, to amend the Community Plan and Plan Area Statement boundaries as shown in Attachment A, Exhibit 1.

In order for motion(s) to pass, an affirmative vote of at least four Board members from each state is required.

Advisory Planning Commission (APC) Recommendation/Discussion

The APC reviewed the proposed amendment at its January 11, 2023 meeting. At that time, they recommended approval of the proposal as presented. The recommendation was unanimous among the commissioners in attendance.

Background:

After the adoption of the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan, a mapping error incorrectly included APN 026-221-029 within the boundary of Truckee Marsh PAS, instead of within the boundary of the Community Plan. This amendment would correct the mapping error by moving both plan boundaries so APN 026-221-029 would be located in the Community Plan as originally intended and mapped.

The Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan was adopted by TRPA and the City of South Lake Tahoe in 1995. The adopted Community Plan Land Use District map, Attachment E, shows that APN 026-221-029 was included within the boundary of the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan at the time of adoption.

Since adoption of the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan, there have been multiple amendments to the document. In 2020, the Land Use District map that was approved by the Governing Board for this amendment includes APN 026-221-029 within the Community Plan boundary, as shown in Attachment F.

APN 026-221-029 is currently vacant. According to a land capability verification completed in 2001, the parcel was verified with land capability Class 1b (SEZ) and Class 7. Current geographic information systems (GIS) maps show the subject parcel within the <u>Truckee Marsh PAS</u>. This PAS is classified as conservation with limited permissible uses. Inconsistency in the mapping of the subject parcel appears to be in error. As stated, the parcel was included within the Community Plan boundary upon its adoption in 1995. If the mapping correction is approved and adopted, permissible uses for the parcel would be subject to the Community Plan. Potential future development on the parcel would be subject to all other TRPA rules and regulations, such as coverage and stream environment (SEZ) 1b protection.

Pursuant to TRPA Code of Ordinances Chapter 10: *TRPA Regional Plan Maps*, plan area GIS data layers and maps are official TRPA Regional Plan maps and proposed amendments to these maps shall be processed plan amendments pursuant to TRPA's Rules of Procedure requiring approval and adoption of the TRPA Governing Board.

Environmental Review:

The amendment has been reviewed in an Initial Environmental Checklist (IEC) pursuant to TRPA Code of Ordinances Chapter 3: *Environmental Documentation* and Article VI of the Rules of Procedure.

Regional Plan Compliance:

The proposed boundary amendment is consistent with the Regional Plan. The Plan, under Chapter 2: Land Use Element states the following policies, listed below in bold, with staff response in italics, that are applicable.

Policy LU-3.4 EXISTING DEVELOPMENT PATTERNS IN RESIDENTIAL NEIGHBORHOODS OUTSIDE OF CENTERS AND ENVIRONMENTALLY-SENSITIVE LANDS SHOULD BE MAINTAINED WITH NO SIGNIFICANT CHANGE.

The parcel was erroneously incorporated into PAS 100 after adoption of the Bijou Al Tahoe Community Plan. This map correction will not change development patterns.

Policy LU-4.1 THE REGIONAL PLAN LAND USE MAP IDENTIFIES GROUPINGS OF GENERALIZED LAND USES AND PRIORITY REDEVELOPMENT AREAS IN THE REGION. AREAS OF SIMILAR USE AND CHARACTER ARE MAPPED AND CATEGORIZED WITHIN ONE OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING EIGHT LAND USE CLASSIFICATIONS: WILDERNESS, BACKCOUNTRY, CONSERVATION, RECREATION, RESORT RECREATION, RESIDENTIAL, MIXED-USE, AND TOURIST. THESE LAND USE CLASSIFICATIONS SHALL DICTATE ALLOWABLE LAND USES. EXISTING URBANIZED AREAS ARE IDENTIFIED AS CENTERS AND INCLUDE TOWN CENTERS, THE REGIONAL CENTER AND THE HIGH DENSITY TOURIST DISTRICT. CENTERS ARE THE AREAS WHERE SUSTAINABLE REDEVELOPMENT IS ENCOURAGED.

The parcel was erroneously incorporated into PAS 100 after adoption of the Bijou Al Tahoe Community Plan. This map correction will not change priority redevelopment areas in the region or allowable land uses in either plan document.

Adopting Ordinance 2023-___

TAHOE REGIONAL PLANNING AGENCY ORDINANCE 2023-__

AN AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 2022-03, AS PREVIOUSLY AMENDED, AND TO ORDINANCE NO. 1987-9, TO AMEND THE BIJOU/AL TAHOE COMMUNITY PLAN AND THE TRUCKEE MARSH PLAN AREA STATEMENT 100 BOUNDARIES AS SHOWN IN ATTACHMENT A.

The Governing Board of the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency does ordain as follows:

Section 1.00 Findings

- 1.10 It is desirable to amend TRPA Ordinance 2022-03 and 1987-9 by amending the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan and Truckee Marsh Plan Area Statement 100 boundaries to further implement the Regional Plan pursuant to Article VI(a) and other applicable provisions of the Tahoe Regional Planning Compact.
- 1.20 The Bijou/Al Tahoe Community and Truckee Marsh Plan Area Statement 100 boundary amendment was the subject of an Initial Environmental Checklist (IEC), which was processed in accordance with Chapter 3: Environmental Documentation of the TRPA Code for Ordinances and Article VI of the Rules of Procedure. The map boundary correction has been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and are therefore exempt from the requirement of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) pursuant to Article VII of the Compact.
- 1.30 The Advisory Planning Commission (APC) and the Governing Board have each conducted a noticed public hearing on the proposed boundary amendment. The APC has recommended Governing Board adoption of the necessary findings and adopting ordinance.
- 1.40 The Governing Board finds that the map boundary correction hereby will continue to implement the Regional Plan, as amended, in a manner that achieves and maintains the adopted environmental threshold carrying capacities as required by Article V(c) of the Compact.
- 1.50 Prior to the adoption of this ordinance, the Governing Board made the findings required by Section 4.5 of the TRPA Code of Ordinances, and Article V(g) of the Compact.
- 1.60 Each of the foregoing findings is supported by substantial evidence in the record.

Section 2.00 TRPA Code of Ordinances Amendments

Ordinance 2022-03, as previously amended, and Ordinance 1987-9 are hereby amended by amending the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan and the Truckee Marsh Plan Area Statement 100 boundaries, as set forth in Exhibit 1 to Attachment A.

Section 3.00 Interpretation and Severability

The provisions of this ordinance amending the TRPA Code of Ordinances adopted hereby shall be liberally construed to affect their purposes. If any section, clause, provision or portion thereof is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance and the amendments to the Regional Plan Package shall not be affected thereby. For this purpose, the provisions of this ordinance and the amendments to the Regional Plan Package are hereby declared respectively severable.

Section 4.00 Effective Date

The provisions of this ordinance amending the TRPA Code of Ordinances shall become effective on _____/



- Rationale:An Initial Environmental Checklist (IEC) has been prepared to evaluate the
effects of the proposed boundary amendment to Plan Area Statement (PAS) 100
Truckee Marsh and the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan (see Attachment C). The
IEC found that the proposed amendment would not have a significant effect on
the environment. The proposed amendment is consistent with and will
implement the Regional Plan. The amendment is minor in nature and is not
anticipated to result in environmental effects.

TRPA Code of Ordinances Section 4. 4 – Threshold-Related Findings

- Finding:
 The project (boundary amendment to PAS 100 and the Bijou/Al Tahoe

 Community Plan) is consistent with and will not adversely affect implementation

 of the Regional Plan, including all applicable Goals and Policies, plan area

 statements and maps, the Code, and other TRPA plans and programs;
 - Rationale:This amendment to the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan map boundary corrects
a mapping error and is consistent with the Regional Plan's goals and policies.
Based on the analysis in the IEC, the boundary amendment is minor in nature
and will not result in environmental effects. The subject parcel and future
potential development was evaluated as part of the Community Plan
environmental review at the time of adoption in 1995. Potential projects or
development of the parcel is subject to TRPA Code of Ordinances and local
building regulations.
- 2. <u>Finding:</u> <u>The project will not cause the environmental threshold carrying capacities to be</u> <u>exceeded; and</u>
 - <u>Rationale:</u> The proposed amendment is consistent with the threshold attainment strategies in the Regional Plan. As demonstrated in the attached IEC, the amendment to the community plan map will not cause the environmental threshold carrying capacities to be exceeded.
- 3. <u>Finding:</u> <u>Wherever federal, state, or local air and water quality standards apply for the region, the strictest standards shall be attained, maintained, or exceeded pursuant to Article V(d) of the Tahoe Regional Planning Compact.</u>

<u>Rationale:</u> The proposed amendment would not adversely affect any state, federal, or local standards.


- Finding:The Regional Plan and all of its elements, as implemented through the Code,

thresholds.
- Rationale: Please see the rationales for the Section 4.4 findings above. The proposed amendment would not adversely affect threshold attainment. All applicable standards in the Code of Ordinances would remain in place. All subsequent development that may occur as a result of this amendment would be subject to TRPA permitting.

TRPA Code of Ordinances Section 11.8.4 – Findings for Plan Area Amendments

- Finding:The amendment to PAS 100 and the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan is
substantially consistent with the plan area designation criteria in subsections
11.6.2 and 11.6.3.
- <u>Rationale:</u> The boundary amendment is consistent with the plan area designation criteria for PAS 100 and the Bijou/Al Tahoe Community Plan. No permissible uses are expanding or changing in either local plan. Each plan's vision, intent, and policies remain unchanged, and all subsequent development is subject to TRPA permitting and must comply with Code of Ordinance standards.


Bijou/Al Tahoe Land Use District Map (1996 adoption)
